EPIC Update

The Epic design process continues in full swing. Marcy Boucher and David Gilchrist attended organization-wide Workflow Adoption Sessions on April 25-27th. They have also been participating in multiple smaller decision making work groups including the Ambulatory Partnership Council, Resident PCP Groups, and will be joining Tina Runyan and Dan Mullin on the Patient Confidentiality Partnership Council. Many of you will be happy to hear that the Resident PCP Group has decided that there will will be multiple PCP designations within Epic. The "Principle PCP" can either be an attending physician, resident physician, or NP/PA. When the "Principle PCP" is a resident physician or NP/PA, there will be a "Supervising PCP" designation, as well as an "Insurance PCP" which may or may not be different from the Supervising PCP. Interesting, there will also be the ability for a specialty group to designate themselves as a "Specialty PCP" if they want to receive further notifications about a patient's clinical activity. Test results and documents generated during resident ambulatory visits will be distributed to the encounter provider (resident) and authorizing provider (attending). Residents will choose the authorizing provider for each clinic session (i.e. the session preceptor). Hospital documentation and test results will be forwarded to the "Principle PCP". Our hope is that these decisions will continue to allow family medicine residents to take primary ownership of their own patient panels. More progress to come!
